Yes, the raceway construction is finally underway. Eighteen of the hatchery's concrete raceways have been completely demolished and are now being reconstructed. This project has been long overdue as the surfaces of the old raceways had begun to break apart. The completion date is uncertain as this time but stocking will resume as usual in March 2015. The hatchery will remain closed to visitors until the construction is complete.



As you know from the last volunteer letter, Deborah Burger retired in April of this year. I have been tasked to take over her duties and responsibilities until the position can be advertised and filled. It will be some big shoes to fill, but I am up for the challenge.

Just to give you a little background information on me, I have been working for the Service for 20 years. My career started at the Bo Ginn National Fish Hatchery below Augusta, Georgia. From there I went to the Wolf Creek National Fish Hatchery in Kentucky. I've spent the last 16 years of my career here at the Chattahoochee Forest National Fish Hatchery.
